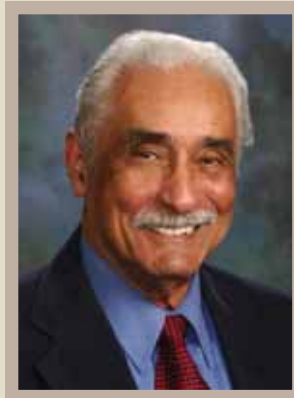

NeuroSpine's affiliation with SAMC provides the community vital access to 24-hour neurosurgery coverage.



Through innovation and sustained performance, this 420 bed regional referral center has achieved the reputation of providing excellent diagnostic, clinical, surgical and patient care services in the battle against leading illnesses and life-threatening diseases. When it comes to quality, SAMC leads the way.

24/7 NeuroSpine care: The Medical Center is the only hospital in the region that offers neurosurgery around-the-clock for brain injuries.

Dr. D. Bruce Woodham has practiced in Dothan more than three decades. Dr. Nicholas F. Voss was trained at Semmes-Murphy Clinic in Memphis, Tennessee, one of the nation's most prestigious neurosurgical programs. Both are highly trained and board-certified neurosurgeons dedicated to developing a comprehensive neurosurgical program at the SAMC.

Award winning stroke care: The American Stroke Association recognized the Medical Center as a Silver Performance Achievement Award winner. The award recognizes the Medical Center's commitment and success in implementing a higher standard of stroke care by ensuring that stroke patients receive treatment according to nationally accepted standards and recommendations.

To receive the award, the Medical Center consistently complied for at least one year with the stringent requirements of the program. We are the only hospital in the area with this certification.

Top performer in providing high quality care: SAMC was named a top performer in a Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) Premier healthcare alliance value-based purchasing project that recognizes hospitals for delivering high quality care in five clinical areas. SAMC received seven awards for Top Performance and Attainment in the clinical areas of Hip and Knee, AMI

(acute myocardial infarction, or heart attack), CABG (coronary artery bypass graft), Heart Failure and Pneumonia.

Blue Cross/Blue Shield, Tier 1 hospital: The Medical Center is the only hospital in Dothan to receive this distinction. Within the Hospital Tiered Network, hospitals are categorized into one of three "tiers", based on their performance in four primary areas of interest (Fiscal, Patient Safety, Quality and Patient Experience). In being a Tier 1 hospital, SAMC is recognized as having attained the highest level of compliance across the four areas of interest. In order to achieve Tier 1 status, hospitals must meet both cost and quality requirements.

New G.I./Endoscopy Center: The 10,000 square foot facility more than doubled the previous space, expanding patient capacity from five to seven endoscopy rooms. The patient holding area increased in size from three beds to eight. Adjacent to the hospital's surgery waiting area, the center provides family members two consultation rooms with direct access to the surgery waiting area.

The new endoscopy center is patient and family-friendly. The addition of rooms and an expanded holding area offers our patients a more comfortable experience. The close proximity of the consultation rooms allows physicians to meet with family members to update them on their loved ones.

The new facility allows us to handle an additional 75 patients a week, or about 300 more patients per month.

Digital mammography provides patients at the SAMC Women's Imaging Center a new weapon in the fight against breast cancer.

Digital mammography takes an electronic image of the breast and stores it directly into a computer database, allowing the recorded data to be enhanced, magnified, or manipulated for further evaluation. SAMC now operates two Hologic Selenia™ full field digital mammography units, with a capacity of approximately 100 patients daily.

Quality:

It's central to everything we do. We care about quality as much as you do. And, our commitment to quality is based on a simple but powerful idea. We exist for one reason and one reason only: To take care of you.



All SAMC staff members who come into direct contact with patients have CPR certification via the American Red Cross. This certification requires annual skills testing.

Safety

“Charlie,” SAMC’s glass-encased pharmacy robot, handles nearly 2,000 orders each day and has yet to get an order wrong. Score another point for improved patient safety.



In SAMC’s lab, medical testing is now highly automated, greatly reducing the risk of human error.

Safety is our No.1 service standard. It is our goal to provide our patients the very safest healthcare environment possible. We are the only hospital in Alabama to have been recognized four years in a row by HealthGrades for patient safety. Highly advanced equipment and a dedicated team of professionals are here to ensure our patients receive the best and safest healthcare in the region.

Robot-Rx system: This robotic drug distribution system automates the storing, dispensing, returning and restocking of inpatient medications. The product is currently installed in only 300 facilities throughout the country.

NarcStation™ provides a closed-loop restocking system for controlled substances between patient care areas and the pharmacy. On the nursing floors, AcuDose-Rx® medication dispensing cabinets allow the nurses to safely and accurately dispense medications.

Home Health partnership: LHC Group, Inc. (NASDAQ: LHCG), one of the largest providers of home nursing services in the United States, entered into a joint venture with SAMC to provide home nursing services. This joint venture includes two home nursing agencies in Dothan and Eufaula.

Cardiovascular expansion: To meet the increasing need for advanced heart and vascular care in the Wiregrass, SAMC announced expansion of its cardiovascular services. The \$18 million expansion includes construction, renovation and relocating the Medical Center’s cardiac catheterization services, vascular testing and other cardiovascular support.

The expansion includes two labs, two operating rooms, and a dedicated outside entrance, or “front door” to heart and vascular services. The project will also provide more capacity for post procedure recovery care and observation. SAMC will add more space for family waiting, consult rooms, and non-invasive heart and vascular testing. Additional area for support functions for heart and vascular services will also be created.

Chemotherapy Center: A new area for outpatient chemotherapy treatment offers patients easier access to comprehensive cancer care. Prior to moving this center to the first floor inside Southeast Regional Cancer Center, patients had to visit separate areas of the hospital for radiation and chemotherapy treatments. Patients now walk a shorter distance to receive the lifesaving treatments they need and also have the option of valet parking.

The patient-centered chemotherapy center opened in June with a dozen treatment recliners and two full-time RNs. This treatment room previously had only five chairs and one nurse.

Today, the RNs treat about 60 patients each week who stretch back in comfortable oversized leather recliners equipped with private televisions and curtains which can be drawn for privacy.

Comfort enhances the safety and quality of care for these patients, who may spend from 30 minutes to six hours a day receiving treatment. Complete with sparkling tile flooring, multiple windows and a skylight filtering natural light, the atmosphere provides a positive, healing environment.

Electronic Records: SAMC realized more than a decade ago that in order to achieve the nation’s demand for improved patient safety and quality of care, while simultaneously reducing costs, that it was imperative to develop electronic health records. This monumental effort has placed us significantly ahead of others in the task of applying computers to the delivery of health care.

Continuous training enhances hospital safety:

Safety classes and certification opportunities are offered to SAMC employees through our Training and Development department. All employees are required to complete an annual learning module on safety in the hospital setting. Additional safety classes offered by Training and Development include:

- Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR)
- Pediatric Advanced Life Support (PALS)
- Advanced Cardiac Life Support (ACLS)
- Neonatal Resuscitation Program (NRP)

SAMC delivered 1,736 new babies to the community in 2009. Superb care and comfort is provided by the staff in the SAMC Women's Center.

Caring

Physical rehabilitation plays an important role in stroke recovery. The American Stroke Association recognized SAMC's efforts in stroke treatment and recovery with its *Get With The Guidelines* Silver Performance Achievement Award.



When you get right down to it, we are here for one reason and one reason only—to take care of our patients. To a person, more than 2,500 dedicated team members are committed to making sure our patients needs are put above all else. They know it could be their child, parent, sibling, or loved one in the room down the hall. Our goal is to be the healthcare provider of choice in this area.

Hospital Heroes: Each year the Alabama Hospital Association honors those who are making a difference in the lives of those they serve. We are proud to share with you the stories of SAMC's three regional winners. These three are representative of the 2,500 healthcare heroes we have at SAMC.

Gabrielle Gassman, RN, Critical Care Unit: Gabrielle Gassman has a soft heart when it comes to taking care of her patients. Now thanks to Gaby and Dothan's Girl Scout Troop 9129, heart bypass patients at SAMC also know what its like to have a soft heart.

Gaby is considered by her teammates as an excellent critical care nurse who gives 100 percent to her patients. She is also a dedicated patient advocate in all areas of care. This dedication to her patients gave her the idea of providing heart bypass patients with a heart shaped pillow. By making it a Girl Scout Project, she hoped to instill in her troop the value of giving back to the community.

Lucille Harris, Environmental Services supervisor: For 44 years, Lucille Harris has been making sure SAMC remains a shining example in the community. As an Environmental Services supervisor, Lucille makes sure SAMC is clean for our patients, visitors and guests. Since starting at the Medical Center in 1964, Lucille has been a hero to many who need a word of encouragement or someone to take a little extra time to explain things to them.

Larry Sowell, Electric Shop electrician: Larry Sowell knows what it means to overcome adversity. He knows the pain of losing a child. He knows what it is like to comfort the family of a cherished friend

who fought a courageous battle with cancer. He knows first hand the devastation of cancer, recently losing his left forearm to this dreaded disease.

Through it all, Larry has remained an inspiration to everyone he comes in contact with at SAMC and in the community. When asked where he gets his strength to overcome, Larry boldly proclaims it comes from his faith in God.

SAMMY Awards recognize employees who consistently demonstrate excellence at SAMC. The SAMMY serves as our employee recognition program and is held annually at the Dothan Civic Center. The 2009 winners were:

Julia Bignoli: After working an eight-hour night shift, Julia Bignoli still has the energy to volunteer mornings at Circle Pharmacy providing flu shots to Wiregrass residents. Julia, a Critical Care nurse, also travels great distances taking vaccines to elderly residents who are unable to visit the pharmacy due to a medical or physical condition.

Julia is also a patient advocate. She recently cared for a patient, a hard worker whose employer did not offer health insurance. The patient wanted to leave, with no way to pay for life-saving surgery. Julia started a fund drive at the patient's place of employment and donated the first \$100. Donations are still coming in. The patient eventually had surgery and credits the Medical Center with saving her life.

Janice Nall: One by one, Janice Nall noticed patients coming into the Veteran's Clinic carrying worn paper bags and socks. As she watched more closely, she noticed the bags and socks were full of medications.

Janice thought there had to be a better way for these men and women who had fought for our freedom to carry their medications. She began sewing cloth bags with drawstrings, monogramming them with specific military emblems. They were a hit with the grateful veterans and Janice has now crafted more than 250.

Liz English: Working in healthcare, one comes in contact with patients who tug at the heart strings. Like an appreciative patient who smiled despite declining health. Or, maybe those with little or no family who were made to feel welcome. What would you do if that patient happened to be the coworker next to you?

Liz English found herself confronted by that very situation. Without batting an eye, Liz packed her bags to take care of a coworker, alone with no family. Liz was there for the sleepless sick nights, making sure he got to his doctor's appointments, cooking meals and treating him like family. Liz put her life on hold for the sake of someone else suffering from cancer.

Ann Rhodes: A cashier and 35 year SAMC employee, Ann makes a trip to the cafeteria a pleasant experience. Ann's compassion is manifested in small acts of kindness that may go unnoticed by most employees. For example, it is not unusual for Ann to take her own money and pay for a coworker's meal.

Ann is service-oriented, committed to her coworkers and dedicated to the customers who come through the cafeteria every day. She knows it is the little acts of kindness that go a long way when it comes to making the Medical Center a great place to work.

Community

The hospital's annual health fair for men, held this year at the Northview High convocation center, drew a crowd of more than 425 men. Most attendees took advantage of an array of free health screenings, including a PSA screen for prostate cancer.



Serving eight counties in southeast Alabama, the Southeast Regional Health Screening Program takes health care screenings to people who might not otherwise get vital tests for breast, colon or prostate cancer, diabetes or other diseases.

As a community owned hospital, SAMC has never lost sight of its mission to promote wellness to those we serve. This hospital belongs to the people and we are here to serve the community through educational events and health fairs. As the healthcare leader in the region, it is our responsibility to be deeply involved in the communities we serve.

Heart 'N Sole: Heart Awareness Month came to a close in February with a celebration at the Dothan Civic Center. Despite cold temperatures, hundreds of women attended the Heart 'N Sole event on February 21. The Civic Center was alive with exercise and dancercise, healthy cooking demonstrations, health screens, education and activities for the entire family. This free community education celebration emphasized the importance of dancercise, exercise, and healthy eating in the prevention of heart disease.

Men's Health Day: Former San Francisco 49ers defensive end Larry Roberts was the celebrity spokesman for the 2009 Community Health Fair for Men. Roberts, a Dothan native, played for Northview High School and the University of Alabama.

This August event was held at the Northveiw High School gymnasium. Men received free tests for PSA (Prostate Specific Antigen), carotid artery screenings (to identify potential blockages in the veins and arteries of the neck, which supply blood flow to the brain), blood pressure checks, cholesterol and thyroid screenings, glucose (blood sugar) tests, height/weight/body fat analysis, stroke assessment and vision testing.

Senior Citizen Day: SAMC is proud to have a long- running relationship each November with the National Peanut Festival as the presenting sponsor of Senior Citizens Day. The event offers a fun filled afternoon of entertainment for area senior citizens. Those who attend can stroll down the exhibit area, eat traditional fair foods and enjoy live entertainment.

Red Balloon Release: The sky around SAMC was filled with red balloons on February 1 as we officially kicked off a month of activities celebrating Heart Awareness Month. The annual event brings attention to preventing heart disease through exercise and diet. Cardiologist Dr. Nelson Gwinn III, Southeast Cardiology, was the keynote speaker along with heart attack survivor and Houston County Healthcare Authority board member Lee Thomas.

Scaleback Alabama: Dothan's three hospitals united to promote healthier lifestyles among its employees by participating in Scale Back Alabama 2009. Hospital CEOs representing SAMC, Flowers and HealthSouth joined forces, as members of the Envision Regional Healthcare Committee, to advocate healthy weight loss in the workplace.

Young Hearts Exercise Class: As part of SAMC's Senior Discovery program, the Young Hearts exercise classes meet five days a week at our Living Well Fitness Center. The popular classes are provided free of charge to anyone 50 years or older who has permission from their physician to exercise.

Lunch with the Doctor: SAMC offers monthly *Lunch or Dinner with the Doctor* programs that are free of charge to the community. These events are hosted in the Doctors Building seventh floor conference room. Physicians discuss the latest technology and treatment of various health issues while providing participants an opportunity to ask questions.

AARP Driver Safety Classes (55 Alive Driving Class): Offered in conjunction with AARP, the driving classes are held free of charge throughout the year at SAMC. These two-day classes allow anyone over 50 years of age to hone their driving skills.

Babypalooza: Hundreds of mothers and mothers-to-be flocked to SAMC's Babypalooza in April for a day of entertainment and education. The free event offered fun activities and seminars, as well as a cutest kids contest. Events included baby bingo, a diaper derby and many nice prizes. An ultimate baby shower prize package filled with gifts worth thousands of dollars was awarded to a lucky ticket holder.

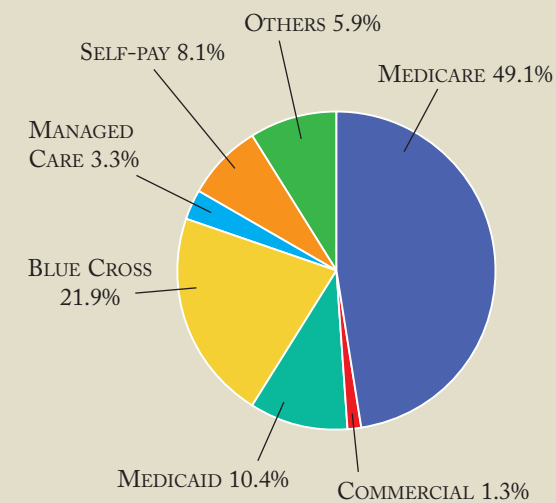

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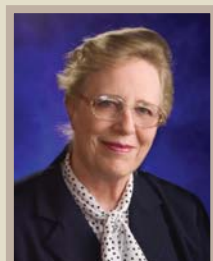
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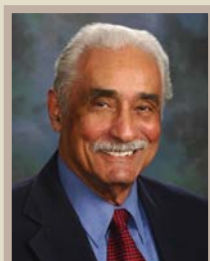
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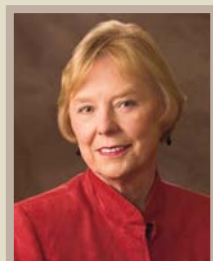
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Dear Medical Center Community,

The Foundation provided a significant financial contribution to the construction of two brand new cardiac catheterization labs.

The Southeast Alabama Medical Center Foundation was created as a charitable organization in May of 2006. By building partnerships and pursuing contributions, funding is provided to SAMC to enhance and advance health and wellness in our community.

The Southeast Alabama Medical Center Foundation made its largest allocation, more than \$200,000, to the hospital in September to support a variety of initiatives from facility expansion to the purchase of life-saving technology.

With guidance from the Foundation Employee Advisory Committee, the Foundation Board of Trustees allocated funding for 15 different projects throughout the hospital including a \$47,000 donation to the Southeast Regional Health Screening Program, a 40-foot mobile screening unit that provides mammography, PSA exams, cardiovascular screenings, and diabetic testing to rural communities in the region.

Valerie Barnes, executive director of the SAMC Foundation says she believes the program plays a vital role in improving the health care of the community. "The screening van provides people who wouldn't normally get these life-saving tests the opportunity to get them. We know early detection saves lives, so if this program can do that then of course the Foundation wants to do its part to keep the van on the road," she says.

Other projects and departments that received funding include Cardiology, Childhood Obesity Initiative, Volunteer Services, the Child Development Center, the Critical Care Unit, Radiology Services, the Enterprise Medical Clinic, SAMC Pharmacy, and the CliniCare Program. Medical Center CEO Ron

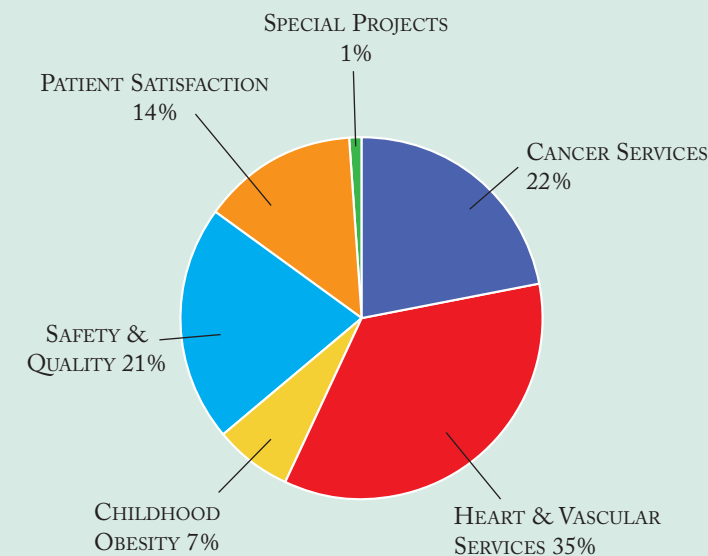
Owen is a strong supporter of the Foundation and its work. "The Foundation is helping us do things now that we would have to do without or put off buying until later. It is making a difference to our employees and to our patients. The most important thing, though, is that Foundation funds are helping us take care of our patients," Owen said.

The Foundation's annual funds allocation process begins in the summer when employees are invited to submit suggestions for consideration. After a review process by the Foundation's Employee Advisory Board and approval by the Foundation Board of Trustees, departments to be awarded funds are notified. Project funds are released beginning in October.
